



Ending the Direct Ground Combat Exclusion Rule for Female Soldiers


The Secretary of Defense announced the end of the direct ground combat exclusion rule for female service members. Accordingly, the Army will increase the number of units open to women and gradually begin assigning women to those units. The Army G-1 is working with Training and Doctrine Command to develop guidance to implement this important and welcome change.


As we integrate women into combat units, the Army is committed to:


- Optimizing mission readiness and esprit de corps.

- Evaluating and adjusting our recruiting efforts, assignment processes, and personnel policies to sustain the envisioned composition of Army units.
- Continually conducting assessments to identify areas of improvement.

This change will give the Army access to the untapped potential that our women warriors have to offer and much-needed flexibility in unit assignments and deployment rotations.
