HOMELAND MISSILE DEFENSE SYSTEM INTERCEPTS ICBM

The U.S. Missile Defense Agency, in cooperation with the U.S. Air Force 30th Space Wing, the Joint Functional Component Command for Integrated Missile Defense and U.S. Northern Command, today successfully intercepted an intercontinental ballistic missile target during a test of the Ground-based Midcourse Defense (GMD) element of the nation's ballistic missile defense system.

This was the first live-fire test event against an ICBM-class target for GMD and the U.S. ballistic missile defense system.

During the test, an ICBM-class target was launched from the Reagan Test Site on Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Multiple sensors provided target acquisition and tracking data to the Command, Control, Battle Management and Communication (C2BMC) system. The Sea-Based X-band radar, positioned in the Pacific Ocean, also acquired and tracked the target. The GMD system received the target tracking data and developed a fire control solution to intercept the target.

A ground-based interceptor was launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, and its exo-atmospheric kill vehicle intercepted and destroyed the target in a direct collision.

"The intercept of a complex, threat-representative ICBM

target is an incredible accomplishment for the GMD system and a critical milestone for this program," said MDA Director Vice Adm. Jim Syring. "This system is vitally important to the defense of our homeland, and this test demonstrates that we have a capable, credible deterrent against a very real threat. I am incredibly proud of the warfighters who executed this test and who operate this system every day."

Initial indications are that the test met its primary objective, but program officials will continue to evaluate system performance based upon telemetry and other data obtained during the test.

The test, designated Flight Test Ground-Based Interceptor (FTG)-15, will provide the data necessary to assess the performance of the GMD system and provide enhanced homeland defense capabilities.

The GMD element of the ballistic missile defense system provides combatant commanders the capability to engage and destroy intermediate and long-range ballistic missile threats to protect the U.S. The mission of the Missile Defense Agency is to develop and deploy a layered ballistic missile defense system to defend the United States, its deployed forces, allies and friends from limited ballistic missile attacks of all ranges in all phases of flight.

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KHS SENIORS HONORED DURING BACCALAUREATE CEREMONY

The U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll community gathered at the Island Memorial Chapel Sunday for the annual baccalaureate ceremony. The formal religious celebration allowed the community an opportunity to congratulate the outgoing 2017 graduating class of Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School for their scholastic and personal achievements throughout their years within the Kwajalein Schools system.

USAG-KA's Command Sgt. Maj. Angela Rawlings, the motivational speaker for the event, was one of three community leaders who addressed the chapel crowd and offer words of wisdom for the seniors. She advised the 15 students to thank their parents for a lifetime of support and love they have received throughout the years. They must be strong in the months ahead when many plan to leave home and start new phases of their lives in college, she said. Being true to one's identity and remaining steadfast in pursuit of their educational goals were keynotes of her address.

"Education is transformative," she said. "It gives you the tools to move forward in life. While you're in college, don't allow anyone to tell you [that] you don't look the part, that you can't become an engineer or a doctor or a lawyer or a pharmacist. And don't for one second tell yourself that you should not be here or that you're not smart enough. You are more than capable."

Calling upon strength during periods of adversity was a topic that Rawlings' address shared with those of Kitlang Kabua and Harden Lelet, the other speakers during the event.

"Graduates, all I ask you to do as you enter the big real world, the big scary world, is to love yourself greatly. And only then will you truly shine," said Kabua, a KHS graduate.

Meanwhile, Lelet implored the students to embrace failure as an inevitable aspect of personal, scholastic and professional growth. Being generous, grateful and loving of God will get them a long way, he added.

Others also took the mic to direct the event. Jon Sok served as the master of ceremonies and gave the invocation, while the Rev. Vic Langhans gave the benediction. KHS juniors Megan Sok and Janalynn Reimers read off the seniors' introductions at the start of the event, and Christine Abragan, DeVante Floor, an Ebeye quartet named the Island Voyz and the Island Memorial Chapel all performed music throughout the night.

MEMORIAL DAY HONORS SERVICE AND SACRIFICE

Friends, visitors, Gold Star family members and service members in the garrison community gathered under the bright mid-morning sun May 29 at Kwajalein's Memorial Day Observance to honor those who died while serving in the U.S. Armed Forces and protecting our nation.

Capt. Alexander Lamb acted as master of ceremonies at the island's ocean-side flagpole site with musical accompaniment provided by the Kwajalein High School Band. The Rev. Vic Langhans delivered an invocation, and USAG-KA Commander Col. Michael Larsen and United States Ambassador to the Marshall Islands Karen Stewart gave an official address and keynote speech, respectively.

Those who encounter service members throughout the world bear witness to countless moments in which the character of honor reveals itself through service. These moments, however small, are like the historical remnants buried deep in the sand of our battlefield home: a profuse and present treasure with transformative potential. In his address Larsen said that learning from these moments is vital to preserving honorable and valorous acts in our personal and national memory. He shared the story of a friend, Sgt. 1st Class Lance Cornett, who gave his jacket away to a man in need. The simple act set a lifelong example before Larsen that he has aspired to meet ever since.

"There are amazing people who we memorialize on this special day, ready to teach us life lessons, whether we are ready to receive them or not," said Larsen. "Take the time to learn about them. If I may humbly suggest, take the time to emulate them with your own personal actions. I would submit, if we do so, there is no better way to ensure their memory lives on."

Stewart described her abiding humility and respect to address the residents of Kwajalein, the site of a historic battle. She recognized the valuable service of the Marshallese in the U.S. Armed Forces and paid special tribute to the memory of Staff Sgt. Solomon Sam, a native of Majuro who passed away in 2008 while serving in Iraq with the 84th Engineer Battalion.

Following Stewart's address, members of the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America presented memorial wreathes to Stewart, Larsen, Command Sgt. Maj. Angela Rawlings and Gold Star family member Michael Sam, the uncle of Staff Sgt. Sam, to be placed at the base of the flags.

Members of Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 1 fired a three-volley salute. A lone trumpet sounded Taps in the salty air.

The garrison community—its service members, veterans, families, siblings and friends—departed the Memorial Day ceremony with the sound of the surf in their ears and much on their hearts. The work now is to persevere: to recognize and support the Armed Forces and to bear witness to their continued selfless example.

CORAL SANDS BONFIRE PROCEDURES

Interested in having a bonfire? Contact Community Activities to reserve Coral Sands Pavilion (you must reserve the facility to have a bonfire). The reservation form must be submitted no later than noon on the Friday before the planned bonfire event.

Community Activities will coordinate the delivery of pallets. No other materials should be burned in the bonfire pit. Once availability of pallets is confirmed, the customer can come by the Grace Sherwood Library for the bonfire instructions.

On the day of the event, contact the fire department for a burn permit and fire extinguisher. The reservation confirmation and bonfire agreement are required. Please note, burn permits are not issued during Small Craft Advisories or periods of inclement weather or if the area is determined to be unsafe. All combustibles should be kept at least 35 feet from the fire.

Pallets should not be stacked more than two high at any time inside the burn pit. This prevents excessive heat and ember development. Burning paper or trash in your fire is not advised as winds tend to carry lighter items away from the burn pit. Extinguish bonfires when winds exceed 20 knots. High winds carry hot embers great distances and ignite vegetation or property.

The customer is responsible for keeping the fire under control and for making sure people at the party behave appropriately around the fire. They must put out the fire at the end of the party and returning the extinguisher to the fire department after the bonfire activity. Any pallets not used for the bonfire activity shall be stacked neatly out of the way (approximately 35 feet away from the burn pit) of other patrons using Coral Sands.

For bonfires at any other location than Coral Sands please coordinate directly with the Kwajalein Fire Department. Special consideration will be given for events such as Boy Scout campouts. Contact Community Activities at 53331 with questions regarding this process.

DIVE SAFETY TIPS!

Always dive with a buddy. Never dive alone.

Wait at least 12 hours before flying after doing a single dive.

Wait 18-24 hours after doing multiple dives.

Divers Alert Network (DAN) recommends refraining from strenuous work at least 24 hours before AND after diving.

Keep your gear up-to-date and serviced regularly. DAN recommends that regulators get overhauled at least once a year.

Each diver should have their own computer.

On any given dive, both divers in the buddy pair should follow the most conservative computer.

Do not ascend greater than 60 feet per minute.

Even if not required, always make a safety stop at 15 feet for at least three minutes.

Start the dive day with the deepest dive first.

Avoid making multiple deep dives on the same day.

WEATHER DISCUSSION: May ended with 5.20 inches of rainfall, or 79 percent of normal. On May 27 we received 2.39 inches, busting our forecast for below-average precipitation for the week. The winds were also light. This allowed temperatures to hit 90 degrees a few times at the end of May.

For this upcoming week, the Madden Julian Oscillation (MJO) is in a pattern which favors above-average precipitation. Also some dynamic weather prediction models are showing large scale patterns indicating the transition from dry season to wet season flow. A few disturbances will pass through the central RMI during this period.

SATURDAY/SUNDAY/MONDAY FORECAST: Widely scattered showers southern atoll, isolated to the north. Winds east-northeast-east at 13-17 knots, increasing to 15-20 knots on Sunday.

MID-WEEK FORECAST: Scattered showers Tuesday, then widely scattered remainder of the week. Winds east-northeast at 12-17 knots.


